HOW TO THE KANCH

PARKING

Display a BBR-issued Access Pass at all times on your vehicle's dashboard or rearview mirror.

NOT ALLOWED

 Parking on roadways or shoulders except for designated areas for pre-authorized events

• Overnight parking of trailers, motorhomes, or RV's in any BBR Lot; (parking of these are allowed on owner property, with a 48-hour limit)



 Unless the BIKE PATH is unavailable, bicycles, walkers, joggers, inline skaters, and personal mobility devices use the bike path, NOT the roadways. BICYCLES are not allowed on any nature trails.

 Register an ELECTRIC BIKE with the Glaze Meadow Rental Shop. All electric bike riders must wear a helmet and be at least 16 years old.

 Anyone under 16 needs to wear a HELMET when operating a bicycle, Razor, or inline skates. BBR recommends helmets for all riders.

STEEPED IN

Before Black Butte Ranch became the destination getaway for memory-making and peaceful living, time and pressure mounted an assault on the surrounding landmass. The terrain holds the geologic secrets and stories of violent volcanoes, wintery thaws, shifting eruptions, seeping waterways, and quaggy sediment.

The Ranch also holds the historical identity of placemaking. Archaeologists discovered ancestral intelligence and toolmaking artifacts near Paulina Springs from about 1,000 years ago. Based upon Native American oral history, Paulina Springs was a base camp between the Great Basin and the Oregon Coast.

In the late 1800s, a vital commerce route passed through the land as seen in two locations: at the north end of the bike path as it passes next to Lupine Lake and west of the Glaze Meadow Sport Shop. (Posts mark both locations.) The original small log structure on the Glaze Meadow Golf Course remains an iconic symbol of the past.

With the 20th Century came more migration and human development. In the mid-1930s, Stewart S. Lowery, a wealthy San Franciscan, bought the land, naming it Black Butte Ranch. In 1940 Carl Campbell became resident manager and ranched the ground until its sale in 1957 to Howard Morgan, a former Oregon Public Utility Commissioner. Morgan then sold the property to Brooks Resources in 1970.

Brooks Resources envisioned a community of residential and summer homes with limited commercial activity on the outskirts of the old lumber town of Sisters. When the lumber mills closed and sent the hamlet into decline, Brooks simultaneously inspired local merchants to reinvest in an architectural, uniform aesthetic of its original roots. The Sisters planning commission adopted the theme, and it became a quaint mountain town of boutiques, cafes, and Oregon souvenirs.

In the 1980s, Brooks transferred ownership of its roadways, paths, outlets, and facilities to the Black Butte Ranch Homeowners' Association, a unique arrangement for such a large residential resort. The Ranch is divided into sections: Golf Home (NW), East Meadow (NE), Spring Home, South Meadow and Rock Ridge (center), and Glaze Meadow (south). There also are three sets of condominiums and various cabin clusters. About 1,200 homesites make up the Ranch.

EXPLORE THE BACKYARD

BLACK BUTTE LOOKOUT

Hike BBR's namesake in this 3.6 mile. 1.556 foot climb. Views of Cascade peaks and BBR await at the summit.

Route #1 From BBR: drive east on Hwy 20 to Indian Ford Campground, near MP 95. Turn north onto paved Green Ridge Road 11. After 3.8 miles, turn left onto gravel Road 1110 for 5.1 miles to a parking area at the road's end. Route #2 Want more of a challenge? Try the historic Black Butte Trail # 4026. From BBR, turn west on Hwy 20 for 2 miles and turn north on FS 14, SW Camp Sherman Road. Park at the trailhead on the right, just past the "Y". This 9.8 mile out and back trail features wild flowers.

METOLIUS BASIN & CAMP SHERMAN

The Metolius River boasts blue waters and lush forests. From the Headwaters of the Metolius (where it springs from the ground) to the Wizard Falls Fish Hatchery, the trails are mostly flat. Stop by the Camp Sherman Store for a treat. The Metolius River Preserve is a beautiful area along Lake Creek that is protected by the Deschutes Land Trust.

From BBR: take Hwy 20 west 2 miles, turn right at the Camp Sherman. Follow FS 14 to a fork and bear right. Continue 7.5 miles, turn left at the Fish Hatchery.

SISTERS TIE TRAIL

Run, hike or bike on a trail that is a mix of old roads and single track, and it runs 6.6 miles one-way with access points along its length.

From BBR, take Hwy 20 west to Road 2060 (McAllister Rd.) and turn left. Park near the intersection with Hwy 20.

SUTTLE LAKE

This flat 3.6-mile trail winds along the forested shore of Suttle Lake with views of Black Butte and Mt. Washington. Just above Suttle Lake is Scout Lake, a shallow, family friendly swimming hole for a warm summer day.

From BBR, take Hwy 20 west 5 miles to the Suttle Lake Campgrounds. Access the trail from several points, including Cinder Beach near Suttle Lake Resort.

MCKENZIE RIVER LOOP | HWY 242 / 126 A beautiful loop that includes a scenic byway that includes waterfalls, observatories and views.

From Sisters: travel west on Hwy 242 (open seasonally), turn on Hwy 126 to visit the waterfalls and Clear Lake before returning to the Ranch via Hwy 22.

DEE WRIGHT OBSERVATORY

Fun observatory in a lava field at the high point of the McKenzie Pass (5,187') with short trails and great views of the Sisters Mountains.

From Sisters: travel west on Hwy 242 (open seasonally) for 15 miles to the Dee Wright Observatory.

PROXY FALLS

This easy loop trail of 1.25 miles to two waterfalls, one of the most photographed spots in Oregon.

From Sisters, at the roundabout, take the first exit onto McKinney Butte Rd. Turn right on Hwy 242 (open seasonally) for 26.6 miles. When Hwy 242 is closed, access the falls via Hwy 126 across from Belknap Hot Springs.

MCKENZIE RIVER WATERFALLS

The McKenzie River Trail offers a 3-mile loop with beautiful forests and views of Sahalie and Koosah Falls. Stop at the headwaters at Clear Lake to see the preserved forest on the lake bottom.

From BBR, head west 18 miles on Hwy 20. Take a left at the Santiam "Y" to stay on Hwy 20, then turn left on Hwy 126 toward Eugene. Turn right at the sign for Sahalie Falls.

WHYCHUS CREEK LOOKOUT

This one-mile accessible trail offers views of the Whychus Creek Wild and Scenic River area and the Three Sisters'

From Sisters, turn south on Elm Street / Three Creek Road / FS 16 and travel 5 miles. Trailhead is on the right.

THREE CREEKS LAKE AREA

Three Creeks Lake has many options to explore, from the steep, 4.5 mile-Tam McArthur Rim to the 3-mile mountain meadow retreat of Little Three Creeks Lake. The Peterson Ridge Trails (biking) and the Whychus Overlook Trail are also accessed from FS 16. Three Creeks Sno Park provides winter hiking, skiing and snowshoeing.

From Sisters, turn right on Elm Street, which will turn into FS 16 to Three Creeks Lake. (The pavement ends after 15 miles). Turn right at the Driftwood Campground. Tam McArthur Rim: across the stream from the parking area by the main road. Little Three Creeks begins at the end of the gravel road.

TUMALO STATE PARK

Pretty river canyon walk along the Deschutes River. Start at Tumalo State Park or Riley Ranch Nature Preserve.

From BBR, take Hwy 20 east to Tumalo, then south 1.6 miles on OB Riley Rd




